FOOD STAMP PROGRAM CHANGES EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1, 2004

By law, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) adjusts the food stamp benefits annually on October 1. The maximum amount of food stamp benefits is as follows:

ONE	-	person	household	\$149	FIVE	-	person	household	\$592
TWO	-	person	household	\$274	SIX	-	person	${\tt household}$	\$711
THREE	_	person	household	\$393	SEVEN	_	person	household	\$786
FOUR	_	person	household	\$499	EIGHT	_	person	household	\$898

For each additional household member over eight, add \$112 per month.

PLEASE NOTE

The above amounts are **maximums.** The amount of food stamp benefits for which a household is eligible depends on household net income after allowable expenses.

USDA adjusts the income eligibility limits for food stamp benefits annually. The maximum net monthly income of a household of various sizes is as follows:

```
ONE - person household $776 FIVE - person household $1836 TWO - person household $1041 SIX - person household $2101 THREE - person household $1306 SEVEN - person household $2366 FOUR - person household $1571 EIGHT - person household $2631
```

For each additional household member, add \$265 per month.

DEDUCTIONS

• The standard deduction is:

```
$134 with 1-4 household members
$153 with 5 household members
$175 with 6 or more household members
```

- The maximum deduction for dependent care is \$200 for any child under age 2 and \$175 for any child age 2 or older.
- The maximum deduction for high housing and utility expense is \$388.
- Households with elderly or disabled members may be eligible for additional deductions.
