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



- Observe caution in the use of percentages when the base for computations is small, especially if observations total less than 100.


**Figure 1. Regions**




**Figure 2. Reason for Child Care**



**Figure 5. Children Served**




**Figure 6. Block Grant Child Care Payments**




# Figure 7. Children Served By Region






**Figure 8. Total Children Served By Age Group**




**Figure 9. Children Served Age < 2 By Facility**



**Figure 10. Children Served Ages 2-5 By Facility**




**Figure 11. Children Served Ages > 5 By Facility**




**Figure 12. Children Served in Center By Age**






**Figure 13. Children Served in Family Home By Age**






**Figure 14. Children Served in Group Home By Age**





April 2016**





April 2016**





April 2016**





April 2016**




**Figure 22. Transitional Children Level 3 by Region  
April 2016**





**Figure 25. Expenditures by Reason for Care**




**Figure 26. Households by Reason for Care**
