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# *Executive Summary*

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## Missouri Department of Social Services


The Department of Social Services was created in 1974 to serve as an umbrella agency, coordinating programs to provide public assistance to children and their parents, access to health care, services to the elderly and specialized assistance to troubled youth. While many programs give needed financial assistance and services, others work to strengthen families and to move them from dependency to self-sufficiency.

The Director of the Department of Social Services (DSS) is responsible for the overall administration of programs within the department and determines priorities and initiatives for the agency. There are five program divisions within DSS responsible for assisting Missouri's most vulnerable citizens: Division of Aging, Division of Child Support Enforcement, Division of Family Services, Division of Medical Services and Division of Youth Services. There are four administrative support divisions within the department: Division of Budget and Finance, Division of Data Processing, Division of General Services and Division of Legal Services.

The purpose of this report is to provide information about the dollars spent and the number of people served by DSS programs during fiscal year (FY) 2001. Where appropriate, information is compared with that of the prior fiscal year to display trends. This report is meant to present summary data, not to be an audited account of expenditures.

### *Division of Aging*


- Over 51,000 elderly persons and disabled adults were authorized to receive home/community based services during FY 2001, a 4.6 percent increase over FY 2000. The majority of clients were authorized to receive personal care and homemaker services. [Table 3, page 18]



- Division of Aging social workers investigated 12,733 reports of elderly abuse, neglect or exploitation during FY 2001, an increase over FY 2000 of 1.3 percent. Upon investigation, almost three-fourths of the reports were classified as "reason to believe" or "suspected." [Table 4, page 20]



***Division of Child Support Enforcement***

- Child support collections increased by 8.9 percent in FY 2001, to \$403 million from \$370 million in FY 2000. Of the 282,177 FY 2001 child support cases, 46,964 (16.6%) were related to cases of Temporary Assistance (Temp/A), while 5.4 percent of collections were related to Temp/A cases. [Table 5, page 26]




**Division of Family Services**

- After decreasing each of the past several years, Temporary Assistance expenditures and average monthly caseloads grew in FY 2001. Expenditures rose from \$141.3 million in FY 2000 to \$142.5, an increase of less than 1 percent. The average monthly caseload also rose less than 1 percent to 48,775. [Table 6, page 32]




- For the second year in a row, Food Stamp expenditures and caseloads experienced a small increase in FY 2001. Annual expenditures rose 7.6 percent and the average monthly caseload increased 6.6 percent from FY 2000 to FY 2001. [Table 7, page 34]


**Figure 6. Average Monthly Number of Families Receiving Food Stamps**





- General Relief (GR) provides assistance to needy and medically unemployable adults who cannot qualify for any other type of assistance. The average monthly GR caseload dropped 15.6 percent from 2,986 in FY 2000 to 2,521 in FY 2001, and expenditures dropped from \$2.8 million in FY 2000 to \$2.4 million in FY 2001, a 16.0 percent decrease. [Table 8, page 36]
- The Supplemental Assistance program includes Supplemental Security Income and State Supplementation (SSI MO) and Missouri State Supplementation Only (MO SUPP). The average monthly Supplemental Assistance caseload decreased 16.8 percent, and expenditures dropped 10.5 percent from FY 2000 to FY 2001. [Table 9, page 38]

- Child care expenditures totaled \$151.5 million in FY 2001, up 12.1 percent from FY 2000. [Table 10, page 40] The following types of child care are provided:
  - family-centered services (FCS), alternative care (AC), children's treatment services (CTS), and intensive in-home services (IIS): child care for children who have been or who are at risk of being abused or neglected;
  - adoption subsidy: child care for children who have been placed in adoptive homes and are receiving adoption subsidy payments due to special needs; and
  - block grant: federally funded child care for low-income families for education, training or employment, or special needs children.




- Children's services expenditures totaled \$194.3 million during FY 2001, a 7.5 percent increase over FY 2000 expenditures of \$180.8 million. The majority of expenditures were for adoption subsidy (\$41.3 million), rehab option (\$40.7 million), and foster care (\$40.4 million). [Table 12, page 44]



- During FY 2001, 53,822 child abuse and neglect incidents were reported, a 9.8 percent increase over FY 2000. Of the FY 2001 reported incidents, 13.4 percent were substantiated. [Table 14, page 52]

### ***Division of Medical Services***

- Based on the average monthly number of Medicaid recipients, the most used services during FY 2001 were managed care (356,802 recipients per month), pharmacy (221,963 recipients per month) and physician related (209,770 recipients per month). [Table 17, page 64]




- Medicaid paid claims continued to climb in FY 2001 to over \$3.7 billion. The majority of Medicaid paid claims (71 percent) were for nursing facility, pharmacy, hospitals, and managed care expenditures. [Table 16, page 60]

### Division of Youth Services

- The number of youth committed to the Division of Youth Services during FY 2001 was 1,248, a decrease of about one-half percent from FY 2000. Recommitments made up 7.2 percent of all commitments in FY 2001, compared to the FY 2000 percentage of 6.8. [Table 18, page 72]

- From FY 2000 to FY 2001, the number of commitments due to law violations increased by 3.1 percent from 1,018 to 1,050, while commitments due to status violations decreased by 16.5 percent from 237 to 198.



- The number of female offenders committed decreased by 6.4 percent from FY 2000 to FY 2001, representing 16.5 percent of all commitments.

- In FY 2000, the most recent year for which data is available, the Juvenile Court Diversion program diverted 4,132 youths from the division, in addition to providing services and prevention programming to 28,938 youths referred to participating juvenile courts.

The Director of the Department of Social Services is responsible for the overall administration of programs within the department and determines priorities and initiatives for the agency. The Deputy Director has the responsibility and authority to act in the Director's absence, and reviews all legal, budgetary and financial aspects of the department. The Associate Director for Policy Coordination oversees Personnel, Data Processing and General Services, and coordinates internal policy development across the department. The Associate Director for Community Relations directs Communications, Research and Evaluation, and activities and initiatives involving community, foundation and private sector relations.

There are five program divisions within the Department of Social Services responsible for assisting Missouri's most vulnerable citizens. These are: Division of Aging, Division of Child Support Enforcement, Division of Family Services, Division of Medical Services and Division of Youth Services. There are four administrative support divisions within the Department of Social Services. These are: Division of Budget and Finance, Division of Data Processing, Division of General Services and Division of Legal Services. The directors of these four divisions operate as a management team to provide assistance and support to the entire department.

### **ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT DIVISIONS**

#### ***Division of Budget and Finance***

The Division of Budget and Finance (DBF) is responsible for providing budgetary and financial support services to all divisions within DSS. The responsibilities of DBF can be divided into the following areas: accounts payable, audit, budget, payroll, receipts and reporting, and purchasing.

#### ***Information Services & Technology Division***

The Information Services & Technology Division (ISTD) provides data services to all divisions within DSS. These services include planning and coordinating all data processing activities as well as the development, maintenance and operation of the department's computer systems.

#### ***Division of General Services***

The Division of General Services (DGS) provides a wide range of support services to all divisions and divisional offices located throughout the state. DGS is responsible for building maintenance and leasing, inventory control and supply distribution, mailing, warehousing, composing and printing, and telecommunications.

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***Division of Legal Services***

The Division of Legal Services (DLS) provides legal, investigative and audit services to DSS. The responsibilities of DLS can be divided into the following areas: legal, welfare and Medicaid investigation, compliance, and internal audit.

The Division of Aging was created within the Department of Social Services by executive order on October 1, 1979. It serves as a central agency to coordinate all matters relating to the lives of older Missourians. Among its goals for Missouri seniors are to improve their quality of life, assure the maintenance of personal dignity and protect their basic rights. The Division of Aging promotes public awareness of the needs and abilities of older persons, and individual freedom among older residents to allow them an opportunity to live safely and independently in their own homes.

The division's services include the home and community services program which provides support for persons ages 60 and older and disabled persons between the ages of 18 and 59, all of whom live at home; adult protective services, which provides immediate assistance to older persons and handicapped adults who encounter abuse, neglect or exploitation; and the institutional program which safeguards residents in long-term care facilities.

As part of the division's home and community services program, Missouri Care Options addresses the long-term care needs of Missouri's citizens. It gives individuals who are considering nursing home placement a range of options about the type of care and care setting that is best for them. MCO offers persons residing in nursing homes the option for home and community services if they choose and if they qualify for lower levels of care. Information about the program is available by calling the Division of Aging's toll-free number, 1-800-235-5503.

The Division of Aging is also committed to safeguarding the health and protecting the rights of residents of long-term care facilities. Division staff inspect and license facilities, and respond to complaints of abuse and neglect. Utilizing specially trained volunteers, the Long-Term Care Ombudsman program offers a way for nursing facility residents to voice their concerns and have their complaints addressed. Ombudsmen work with residents, family members and staff to maintain or improve the quality of life of nursing facility residents.

In October of 1980, the Division of Aging established the Central Registry Unit (CRU) to screen and refer reports of elder abuse and neglect through the statewide hot line. The CRU handles calls regarding elder abuse, neglect and financial exploitation; regulation violations in facilities licensed by the division; MCO screening referrals; referrals to other agencies; and requests for information. The CRU abuse and neglect hotline operates year round, 24 hours a day and may be reached at 1-800-392-0210.

The establishment of a child support enforcement program was mandated by Congress in 1975 and became operational in Missouri in 1977. In 1985, the Division of Child Support Enforcement (DCSE) was established by executive order. DCSE helps parents establish paternity for children born out of wedlock; establish orders for child and medical support; enforce child, spousal and medical support orders; and modify support orders.

The division serves both the custodial and non-custodial parent. It automatically provides services to custodial parents of children who receive Temporary Assistance and Medicaid. Parents of children who do not receive either Temporary Assistance or Medicaid benefits are also eligible for the division's services and may apply at any DCSE office or call Customer Relations at 1-800-859-7999 for more information.

The child support enforcement program is administered from the Jefferson City central office, with the bulk of the responsibilities carried out at the local level in a cooperative effort with prosecuting attorneys and circuit clerks.

The Division of Family Services (DFS), established in 1974 with the creation of the Department of Social Services, is responsible for the administration of public assistance and children's services programs. DFS maintains an office in each county throughout the state and in St. Louis City. Each county office also has a family services commission which serves DFS in an advisory capacity, helping to assure that DFS programs remain sensitive to the needs of clients as well as provide public access for input at the county level.

DFS administers federal- and state-funded programs that provide a range of services to Missouri's eligible children, families and individuals. Four principal program units coordinate the distribution of services: the Income Maintenance section administers financial and medical assistance programs; the Case Management program provides employment and training to persons receiving Temporary Assistance; the Children's Services section administers services to children and their families who need help because of child abuse or neglect or may need other services such as counseling, foster care or residential treatment; and Rehabilitation Services for the Blind administers programs to serve blind and visually impaired individuals.

In determining eligibility for public assistance programs, DFS considers the applicant's earning capacity, income and resources. This determination is basic to the granting of Temporary Assistance, Blind Pension, Food Stamps, General Relief, Supplemental Aid to the Blind, Medical Assistance and Nursing Care benefits.

Children's services programs are provided under federal and state laws to help each eligible child and family attain and maintain a maximum level of personal and social functioning. DFS is legally mandated to provide services in two broad categories: child abuse and neglect investigations, and treatment services for children and their families.

The DFS Central Registry Unit accepts confidential reports of suspected child abuse or neglect. The hot line is answered seven days a week, 24 hours a day and may be reached at 1-800-392-3738. DFS also operates a Parental Stress Helpline which is available for parents who feel overwhelmed with parental pressures and responsibilities. This helpline operates seven days a week, 24 hours a day and may be reached at 1-800-367-2543. Children's Treatment Services are available for the prevention of child abuse and neglect and for treatment of abuse and neglect victims. Treatment services are provided in the best interest of the child.

The Division of Medical Services (DMS), established in 1985 under the Department of Social Services Reorganization Plan, administers the Missouri Medicaid program authorized under Title XIX of the Social Security Act and enacted by state legislation. Professional and technical consultation is received from a medical advisory committee and subcommittees.

Medicaid is a program of medical assistance for the poor jointly funded by state and federal funds. Its goal is to provide health care for needy individuals through payment to providers of medical goods and services. In addition to reimbursing vendors for the provision of services, DMS also pays insurance premiums, deductibles and co-payments for certain aged and disabled Medicare beneficiaries.

Major services provided through the Medicaid program include inpatient and outpatient hospital services; nursing home care; physician and pharmacy services; laboratory and x-ray; home health; audiology, dental, optometric and podiatry; ambulance services; adult day health care; personal care services; nurse-midwife, nurse practitioner services; hospice services; case management services for pregnant women and children; durable medical equipment, orthotic and prosthetic devices; and ambulatory surgical centers.

The Division of Medical Services also administers the Healthy Children and Youth program, a comprehensive medical program focusing on primary and preventive services for individuals up to age 21. Through the program, children receive medical, hearing, dental, and eye examinations; appropriate laboratory tests; immunizations; lead screens; and referral for follow-up care for evaluations of problems detected during a screen.

The Division of Youth Services (DYS), established in 1974 with the creation of the Department of Social Services, provides a range of services to youths who have been committed to DYS by the juvenile court system and are in need of rehabilitative and educational services. Chapter 219, RSMo further defines the responsibilities of DYS to include the prevention of delinquency; the provision of incentive subsidies to juvenile courts; consultation and information services to non-DYS agencies; and technical assistance to local communities.

The Division of Youth Services serves youths ages 17 and under who have been adjudicated as status or delinquent offenders. Once committed to DYS, youths can be held until age 21. Most sentences are indeterminate, with youths assigned to a facility until they are approved for return to their homes under supervision of DYS' aftercare program. DYS operates several programs with varying levels of security throughout the state, including group homes, park camps, specialized residential programs and non-residential community-based programs. Other services include case management, intensive case monitoring, proctor care and family therapy.

Implemented in the late 1970's, the Juvenile Court Diversion program is intended to divert the less serious offenders from the Division of Youth Services and allow the courts to work with these youths and their families in their home communities.
